Students understand and are able to describe legal issues that may arise from international sales transactions/contracts based on the regulatory standards in CISG, Incoterms 2020, and UCP 600, in the stages of contract formation, contract execution, and the implementation of the rights and obligations of the Seller and Buyer in international sales transactions.
